

LSU HEALTH SHREVEPORT



PROGRESS THAT MATTERS

The first new building on the LSUHS campus, the Center for Medical Education, opened during the past year providing a transformative environment for students. The \$84M facility enabled the implementation of a new curriculum while providing enhanced wellness options and centralized student support resources.

Students at the LSUHS School of Medicine increased their research project participation and authoring of peer reviewed papers by double digits in FY23-24. With "matching" to a residency becoming even more competitive with the addition of new US medical schools, LSUHS is focused in maintaining their five-year match average of 99%.

LSU Health Shreveport has entered into a Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA) with the Air Force Global Strike Command at Barksdale AFB to study the physiological and cognitive impact of long duration deployments.

LSU Health Shreveport is one of a limited number of sites nationally selected to participate with the Joint Disaster Medicine and Public Health Research Ecosystem.

LSU Health Shreveport is the national leader in enrolling patients into the Black and African American Connection to Parkinsons Disease clinical trial and was the first site in Louisiana to be selected to participate in this MJFox funded clinical trial.

The natural gas production in the Haynesville Shale peaked in May 2023 and is 14% lower in September 2024.



ACROSS THE NATION

- The U.S. was the world's largest liquefied natural gas exporter in 2023, with LA handling 61% of U.S. LNG exports to 30 countries such as France, the U.K., Netherlands, Spain and S. Korea, among the largest recipients.
- Louisiana's 15 crude oil refineries account for about one-sixth of the nation's refining capacity and can process nearly 3 million barrels of crude oil per day.
- Louisiana's total energy consumption ranks fourth in the U.S. and it's per capita energy consumption is the second highest, mainly due to energy-intensive chemical, petroleum, and natural gas industries. However, LA has the highest per capita residential sector electricity consumption in the U.S.
- The most active natural gas market center in North America is the Henry Hub in Erath, Louisiana-where nine interstate and three intrastate pipelines interconnect.

USGS STUDY REVEALS SIGNIFICANT LITHIUM POTENTIAL IN THE SMACKOVER FORMATION



US Geological Survey-led study estimated between 5 and 19 million tons of lithium reserves are located beneath southwestern Arkansas in the Smackover Formation. If commercially recoverable, the amount of lithium present would meet projected 2030 world demand for lithium in car batteries nine times over.

While Louisiana has yet to be explored for lithium, 2024 Senate Bill 285, now Act 126, takes a step in the direction of encouraging exploration of lithium in Louisiana. The law now gives authority to the Office of Conservation to establish units (a particular set of acres) for brine

production, and to add brine to the substances currently regulated by the state's mineral code.

LNG PAUSE

In January, the Biden Administration, through the Department of Energy, issued a pause on liquefied natural gas

export approvals. Sixteen attorney generals, including Louisiana's, filed suit. Congress drafted bills to combat the pause. On July 1, the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Louisiana issued a temporary injunction on the pause but DOE still has the authority to vet whether an LNG project is of public interest before granting licenses.

Projects waiting for that approval include the Calcasieu Pass 2 and Commonwealth LNG projects in Louisiana and an expansion of the Corpus Christi LNG project in Texas.

DIRECT AIR CAPTURE (DAC)

DAC technology is a form of carbon dioxide (CO2) removal that takes CO2 from ambient, or still, air. The separated CO2 can then be permanently stored deep underground, or it can be converted into products. **Source:** Department of Energy

BLUE METHANOL

Produced using blue hydrogen in combination with carbon capture technology, blue methanol is vastly reducing well-to-tank carbon dioxide emissions.

The backlog of road and bridge projects in Louisiana has grown to \$19 billion.




PERCENTAGE OF STRUCTURALLY **DEFICIENT BRIDGES**

PORT'S REACH

Understanding the movement of goods is vital to businesses, residents, and those responsible for transportation improvements. The <u>Northwest Louisiana Council of Governments</u> looked at how freight movements were made in relation to the <u>Port of Caddo-Bossier</u>. This created a unique form of Origin-Destination (O-D) analysis for commercial traffic originating from and ending at the port complex to determine the true reach of goods movement to and from the port.


