QUESTIONS:

- 1. What skills and experience do you have that you believe would be beneficial to you as a council member? QUESTIONS:

1. What skills and experience do you have that you believe would be beneficial to you as a council member?

I grew up in a family business, my dad opened Smith's Shell on Barksdale Blvd in 1962. In the mid '80's, I owned and operated the business. I went to work in a technical field and later as an outside salesman, where I was not afraid to fight for my customers, which is something I believe a councilman would do, fight for his constituents. I was the president of the Parkway Band Boosters and when our group of officials took over, there was a \$0 balance in their account and when we left four years later, there was over \$150,000 in their account.

2. What do you consider the most pressing issues facing Bossier City, and what are your plans to address them?

The thing most people aren't talking about is the deficit; we have got to get the budget under control and stop unnecessary spending. There is a difference between wants and needs, and we need to focus on the needs. Our infrastructure is getting old and we need to address staying ahead of the problem of broken water and sewage lines. We also must address the retention of our employees, especially the police and firefighters. I plan to work along side of the other council members to plan to identify the needs, address the aging infrastructure with the engineering department and work to find solutions to retaining our current work force.

- 3. How should the council collaborate with other government agencies, such as the parish or neighboring cities/towns to address regional issues?
 - Bossier City is not on an island, we are part of the greater region. We must work well with the School Board, Police Jury, Sheriff's department as well as our neighboring towns and cities. What affects one, possibly affects everyone. We must keep an open dialog with all of our neighbors and be cheerleaders for all as I would expect them to be for us.
- 4. How would you balance representing the needs/wants of your home district and making decisions that will benefit the whole city?

My first responsibility is to represent district 3, to make sure the needs of the district are met, but the citizens of district 3 must communicate what those needs are. There are plans for town hall meetings to occur on a quarterly basis so we can have communication about those needs and to keep the citizens informed of the happenings within the city.
